



Pope's Easter Urbi et Orbi message: "The contagion of hope"

Pope Francis' 'Urbi et Orbi message on Easter Sunday challenges us to ban indifference, selfcentredness, division and forgetfulness during this time of Covid-19 – and to spread the "contagion" of hope.

No banner hung from the central balcony of St Peter's Basilica. No bands played the Vatican anthem. No floral arrangements decorated St Peter's Square. Nearby streets were empty and silent, as Italy continues to respect a nationwide coronavirus lockdown.

Inside the Basilica, surrounded only by his closest collaborators, Pope Francis delivered his traditional Easter *Urbi et Orbi* message to the city of Rome and the world.

A different "contagion"

Millions of people watched and listened on various media platforms as the Pope repeated the Easter proclamation: "Christ, my hope, is risen!". He called this message "a different 'contagion'", one that is transmitted "from heart to heart".

This Good News is like a new flame that springs up "in the night of a world already faced with epochal challenges, and now oppressed by a pandemic severely testing our whole human family", said the Pope.

Christ's resurrection is not a "magic formula that makes problems vanish", he continued, "it is the victory of love over the root of evil". This victory "does not 'by-pass' suffering and death, but passes through them, opening a path in the abyss, transforming evil into good", he added.

Comfort for those affected by the coronavirus

The Pope's thoughts turned immediately to those directly affected by the coronavirus. "For many, this is an Easter of solitude, lived amid the sorrow and hardship that the pandemic is causing, from physical suffering to economic difficulties", he said.

"This disease has not only deprived us of human closeness, but also of the possibility of receiving in person the consolation that flows from the sacraments, particularly the Eucharist and Reconciliation", said Pope Francis.

"But the Lord has not left us alone", he added. "United in our prayer, we are convinced that He has laid His hand upon us".

Gratitude to those providing essential services

The Pope then expressed his gratitude and affection to doctors and nurses, and "to all who work diligently to guarantee the essential services necessary for civil society, and to the law enforcement and military personnel who in many countries have helped ease people's difficulties and sufferings".

Encouragement to work for the common good

Pope Francis acknowledged that "this is also a time of worry about an uncertain future, about jobs that are at risk". He encouraged political leaders "to work actively for the common good", providing the means "to enable everyone to lead a dignified life and, when circumstances allow, to assist them in resuming their normal daily activities".

Not a time for indifference

This is not a time for indifference, said the Pope, "because the whole world is suffering and needs to be united in facing the pandemic". He prayed that the risen Jesus may grant hope "to all the poor, to those living on the peripheries, to refugees and the homeless". Pope Francis also called for the relaxation of international sanctions and for "the reduction, if not the forgiveness, of the debt burdening the balance sheets of the poorest nations".

Not a time for self-centredness

This is not a time for self-centredness, continued Pope Francis, because "the challenge we are facing is shared by all". Europe, in particular, was able "to overcome the rivalries of the past" following the Second World War, "thanks to a concrete spirit of solidarity". It is urgent "these rivalries do not regain force", the Pope continued. We all need to recognize ourselves "as part of a single family and support one another". Selfishly pursuing particular interests risks "damaging the peaceful coexistence and development of future generations", he added.

Not a time for division

This is not a time for division, said the Pope, as he appealed for "an immediate global ceasefire in all corners of the world". Criticizing the vast amounts of money spent on the arms trade, Pope Francis called for a solution to the ongoing conflicts in Syria, Yemen, Iraq and Lebanon. He said he hoped Israelis and Palestinians might resume dialogue, that the situation in eastern Ukraine might be resolved, and that "terrorist attacks carried out against so many innocent people in different African countries may come to an end".

Not a time for forgetfulness

This is not a time for forgetfulness, continued Pope Francis, referring to the humanitarian crises being faced in Asia and Africa. He prayed for refugees and migrants "living in unbearable conditions, especially in Libya and on the border between Greece and Turkey". The Pope prayed also that solutions may be found in Venezuela, allowing "international assistance to a population suffering from the grave political, socio-economic and health situation" there.

Christ dispels the darkness of suffering

"Indifference, self-centredness, division and forgetfulness are not words we want to hear at this time", said the Pope. These words "seem to prevail when fear and death overwhelm us", and we want to ban them forever, he added.

Pope Francis concluded his *Urbi* et *Orbi* message with a prayer: "May Christ, who has already defeated death and opened for us the way to eternal salvation, dispel the darkness of our suffering humanity and lead us into the light of His glorious day. A day that knows no end".

Look at Him in our Doctors, and Medics who fall tired and exhausted.

With humble Simon of Cyrene helping at each step, Nurses, Care-givers, Janitors, side by side with them, without rest.

Like Jesus, who passed through the earth on a donkey, So do our heroic truck drivers spend the nights awake, to supply markets, neighbourhoods, pharmacies and shops.

The Police and Military patrol deserted streets and they are not with their families because they are taking care of ours.

And far from the cities, Jesus is bent on the furrows of earth.

He goes to sea on a boat,

Lays cables, digs wells or grazes the cattle.

Let no one say that the Lord is not present on the streets. When, in empty Churches, Priests celebrate daily Mass.

Let no one say that the One condemned is not coming out this year. As long as there is a kindly voice invoking the one locked up.

Let no one say that the All-powerful One will not take His walk this year. When so many are praying and offering their lives in love.

With tiredness, good humour and without fail.

Christ is also present in supermarkets, replenishing shelves, or charging at the cash register.

Jesus comes in a truck, painted green, white, orange, collects our garbage and goes away unnoticed.

When I see so many who have buried their own I feel that even the Patroness of the Slums.

The 'Virgin of Sorrows' has come out with her son on her lap.

And, even if passing through the Sepulchre frightens us all. There is where the strength lies, of the One who has conquered the world.

Perhaps there will be no processions with carved images.

But now you see Christ meeting you amid life.

Hidden in thousand faces, without candles and bells.

And even if there will be no Processions this Summer, We will continue to smell the incense of the faith of your people.

Love leaps over the walls, the heart does not lock up. It will be a Holy Week, more than ever, true.

COVID 19, OUR PARISH CHURCH CLOSED ON MONDAY 23 MARCH, AND WILL REMAIN SO UNTIL FURTHER ADVISED:

The Parish Priest will continue to celebrate Mass in the Parish without the Faithful (Parishioners) Deacons and Altar Servers. The continuing celebration of Mass ensures that the Faithful can join in Spiritual Communion with the Priests of the Church.

BAPTISMS: Baptisms will be deferred until such time that the Public Health Advice is that congregations can gather safely. In case of necessity, Baptisms should be celebrated with all the hygiene precautions that have been laid down by the Church in its COVID-19 advice. The Parish Priest will be contacting all Parishioners who have a Baptism booked.se. **FIRST RECONCILIATION AND FIRST COMMUNION:** These celebrations

RECONCILIATION AND FIRST COMMUNION: These celebrations are postponed until a time that allows for families and friends to gather safely within our Church. The Parish Priest and School Headteacher will confirm new dates as soon as it is safe to do so. **MATRIMONY:** If possible, the celebration of the Sacrament of Matrimony should be deferred until such time that people can gather in numbers safely. However, if this is not possible and only in the most pressing of circumstances, then those present for the marriage should be restricted to the Celebrant, Bride and Groom and immediate family, & if necessary, the legal Registrar. The Parish Priest will be in contact with any couples preparing for marriage. **SACRAMENTS OF**

INITIATION AT THE EASTER VIGIL: This will be dependent on the forthcoming decisions of the Bishops for the Holy Week ceremonies. The Parish Priest will be in touch with those preparing for the Sacraments of Initiation in due course. CONFIRMATION: The celebration of Confirmation will be deferred until such time that the Public Health advice is that congregations can resume public worship. ANOINTING OF THE

SICK: No pastoral visits will be made to people unless in an emergency. However, we will offer phone support (SEE NOTICE.) Anointing of the Sick will be carried out by the Priest, avoiding physical contact, adhering to the hygiene procedures set out. Visits to care homes/ hospitals will follow advice

from the staff on infection control. $\ensuremath{\textit{HOLY COMMUNION AND}}$

PASTORAL VISITS TO THE SICK AND HOUSEBOUND: As our Eucharistic Ministers are mainly over the age of 70 we are suspending visits for the time being & offering phone support, contact the Parish Office: 0191 2623817. The Priest and Funeral Directors will work together to support

families who are experiencing bereavement. **SACRAMENT OF**

RECONCILIATION: Confessions may be offered on request as long as hygiene and social distancing requirements are observed (e.g. a physical barrier between the Penitent and Priest, such as a grille and cloth.) The use of Rite II and Rite III of the Rite of Penance is not permitted as this, by necessity requires the gathering of people in our Churches.

O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fountain of Mercy for us, I trust in You!

3. 'Our Father,'

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name; Thy kingdom come; Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil. Amen.

"Hail Mary,"

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

"And The Apostle's Creed."

I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried: He descended into hell; on the third day He rose again from the dead: He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty: from there He will come to judge the living and the dead

...I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.

4. On the Our Father beads

Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

5. On the Hail Mary Beads pray,

For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

6. Pray three times,

Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

(Optional*) Eternal God, in whom mercy is endless and the treasury of compassion inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase Your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with great confidence submit. ourselves to Your holy will, which is Love and Mercy itself.

Close with the Sign of the Cross.

Jesus' promise to St. Faustina

"Say unceasingly this chaplet that I have taught you. Anyone who says it will receive great Mercy at the hour of death. Priests will recommend it to sinners as the last hope. Even the most hardened sinner, if he recites this Chaplet even once, will receive grace from My Infinite Mercy. I want the whole world to know My Infinite Mercy. I want to give unimaginable graces to those who trust in My Mercy....

"....When they say this Chaplet in the presence of the dying. I will stand between My Father and the dying person not as the just judge but as the Merciful Savior".
