THIS WEEKS REFLECTION FROM FR. JONATHON

In today's gospel two Greeks approach not Jesus but Philip (a Greek name). Up to this point in Jesus' ministry according to the Gospel of John, Jesus has never, not once, interacted with a Gentile (non-Jew). Luke, of course paints a different picture, but today we are reading from the Gospel of John.

Philip listens to the request of these two Greeks who want to see Jesus and, in turn, goes to Andrew to enlist his help with this unorthodox request. Together the disciples intercede for these two Greeks. Jesus rightly perceives this to be the conclusion of his ministry. If even the Greeks are now coming to see him, the end is near! Death is at the ready. Jesus then begins an eloquent teaching on the necessity of death for bearing fruit, and no mention is made that the Greeks ever met Jesus. Instead, they serve merely as a narrative tool to usher in the final days of Jesus' ministry.

It's true that the ancients did not have the knowledge about biology that we have today. Upon hearing the metaphor of a seed dying to produce much fruit, many a modern audience might dispute the analogy. For we know that a seed does not truly die, but the soil, moisture, and light cause an organic change. Still we do not want to lose the message in spite of the metaphor. Only by his death will Jesus' ministry truly bear fruit. That is the necessary next step. His death is necessary because this is the purpose for which he came. There is no sidestepping or dodging this inevitable end, which is ratified by a voice from heaven. The end is near.

In this Lenten Sunday preceding Palm Sunday we share a sense of impending doom. But we are reminded of the necessity of death for something to bear fruit. If the seed stays on the countertop, it will never bear fruit. But once 'dead' and planted in the ground, the seed produces. The paschal mystery is presented for us in a simple agrarian, even if scientifically outdated, image.

Do we allow ourselves to die to our own desires, wants, and agenda? From today's gospel reading, it seems Jesus was not quite ready for this moment. But the arrival of the Greeks was a clarion signal that the end was near. Even for Jesus there was no fighting this eternal purpose. This was the reason he came into the world. His example of letting go serves as a model for us. We are not the masters of our own fate. We are not in ultimate control of our own destiny. The illusion that we are somehow planning our own destiny is simply that, an illusion. What are the signs that encourage us to let go of our own desires and submit to something greater? When we die to ourselves we will see fruit that bears eternal life.

MONDAY LENT TALKS - 7 LAST WORDS OF JESUS

During Lent we are encouraged to give a renewed focus to prayer, fasting and almsgiving in our lives. These traditional Lenten activities help us to form new and good spiritual habits that prepare us for our celebration of Holy Week and lead us to the everlasting reward of God's transforming grace. I hope too, that you will take the opportunity to participate in our programme of Lenten activities. Immediately after Mass on a Monday evening, Fr Jonathon will be giving a series of short reflections on the 7 last words of Jesus upon the cross. These will last roughly I5minutes and will be a good way to reflect upon the words spoken to us from the Cross.

PASSIONTIDE & THE VEILING OF CROSSES AND STATUES

This weekend we enter into passion-tide. From the Fifth Sunday of Lent until the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday the crosses and statues of our churches are veiled in purple cloths. The veiling of crosses and images is a sort of "fasting" from sacred depictions which represent the paschal glory of our salvation. Just as the Lenten fast concludes with the Paschal feast, so too, our fasting from the cross culminates in an adoration of the holy wood on which the sacrifice of Calvary was offered for our sins. Likewise, a fasting from the glorious images of the mysteries of faith and the saints in glory culminates on the Easter night with a renewed appreciation of the glorious victory won by Christ, risen from the tomb to win for us eternal life.

NEXT SUNDAY

Next weekend we celebrate Palm Sunday. As part of the celebration we will commemorate the entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem. All Masses will begin outside, weather permitting.

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION GROUP

Sister Sylvia will be leading a scripture reflection group on a Tuesday evening at 7pm at St Anthony's Presbytery. The group will look at the coming weeks scripture readings and reflect upon them. Everyone is most welcome!

HOLY WEEK MASSES AND SERVICES

As we prepare for the most holiest of weeks in our Christian Calander there will be a weekly insert in the bulletin asking us to reflect upon what we are about to celebrate, and why we celebrate these various liturgies. I would encourage each one of you to make every effort possible to come along to the Triduum liturgies as we journey with Our Blessed Lord from Cross to Resurrection. As we will see over these next few weeks The Sacred Triduum is one liturgy, from the Mass of the Lord's supper to the Easter Vigil, that is why we are keeping it in one church.

If you would like to be involved, either by reading one of the readings, leading the prayers of the faithful, being an 'apostle' and getting your foot washed, or could stay with Our Lord for an hour at the Altar of repose please signup on one of the forms in the porches of our churches. These roles have been shared out equally across the parishes.

EASTER RAFFLES

Once again our churches are organising Easter Raffles. If you would like to donate any Easter Eggs or bottles please bring these along and leave in the Sacristy. Raffle Tickets will be available after weekend masses over the next few weeks. At St Lawrence's they will be running the 'pick a bag' for a £1, with a prize guaranteed with every bag. This will happen on the 17th and 24th March after Mass in the Parish Hall.

YOUNG ADULT PRAYER GROUP

After Easter a 'Young Adult Prayer Group' will be formed in our parishes. The group is for those who are between 18 & 35 who would like to meet to discuss the faith, to spend time in prayer together, and to encourage each other in following the Lord's will for them. The group will meet on the Fourth Thursday of every month, meeting from 7pm at St Teresa's. The First meeting will take place on Thursday 25th April.
