THIS WEEKS REFLECTION FROM FR JONATHON

Every year the gospel of the second Sunday of Lent tells of the Transfiguration of Jesus. It is a moment when the disciples get a small glimpse of God in human flesh, as Jesus' divinity shines through his humanity. Soon afterwards, Jesus will begin the long journey to Jerusalem, where he will be rejected, suffer and die. The meeting with Moses and Elijah on the mountain confirms that Jesus is truly the Messiah, and that his glorious destiny will be achieved through pain and death. It's a truth that applies to all of us: the last word in the struggle of the Christian life does not, in fact, lie with struggle - the last word lies with seeing the glory of God.

Many Christians seek peace of heart and mind in their life of faith. Many value the character-building qualities of Christian discipline and want to raise their families in that spirit. Some want to strengthen their life of virtue. Some seek consolation because they are in pain and want to join their suffering to the suffering of Christ. Others find the gospels a source of energy and inspiration to make the world a better place. These are all good and holy pursuits, but still they are not the true prize of a faithful Christian life. Today, and every day, we are invited to imitate St. Paul, not just in the discipline of his life in Christ but primarily in his hopeful expectation to be united with Christ in the full glory of the Resurrection. This is our true prize: the transformation of "our lowly body after the pattern of Christ's own glorious body", which finds its fullness and end in the vision of God, face to face.

WE KEEP IN OUR PRAYERS

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

During Lent we are invited to journey with Our Lord to Calvary by making the stations of the Cross. This will take place every Tuesday at 9.15am at St Anthony's and every Friday at 6.30pm at St Teresa's.

LENTEN ALMS

During Lent we will be supporting several charities, all with a particular focus as Catholic Charities. St Cuthbert's Care is our diocesan Charity and all Lenten Alms collections go towards their work here in the diocese supporting many different things that they do. This year in particular they ask that the financial support that we offer goes towards their Young Stars Fostering Group. We will also be supporting CAFOD with their Family Fast Day with the collection being taken on the 15/16th March.

LENT SCRIPTURE COURSE - COME AND SEE

Every Monday throughout Lent we will be holding a Scripture Study Group called 'Come and See'. This will take place in the porch at St Teresa's from 2-3.30pm. Tea and Coffee will be available. Please do come along if you are able to.

And being so far away at the back, they don't know what's happening at the front because they can't see and sometimes can't hear! Please come to the front of the Church, to the seats where your children will be able to see what is going!




PARISH OPEN MEETING





LEARNING MORE ABOUT THE FAITH THE SEASON OF LENT

Return, repent, reconcile, and renew are words that we hear in the liturgies of Lent. A common factor among these words is the prefix re-. That prefix expresses the meaning "again," as in words such as redo, remake, and revise; but it also indicates withdrawal or backward motion, as in words such as return, revert, and remember. During Lent, we are called to change by going back to childlike innocence, simplicity, and joy.

Prayer helps us to return to childlike innocence. Prayer prompts us to withdraw. As Jesus said, "When you pray, go to your inner room, close the door, and pray to your Father in secret" Prayer nurtures our relationship with God. Prayer also nurtures our relationship with ourselves. Prayer peels away the masks we wear and the layers of ego defences we think we need to survive. Prayer tells us that it's okay to be who we really are. Prayer changes us.

Fasting helps us to return to childlike simplicity. Fasting challenges us to trust that God will provide all that we need. Fasting helps us to sort our priorities. Because the digestive system doesn't have to work as hard when we fast, we have more energy to focus on what matters. Fasting creates a hunger for God. Fasting changes us.

Almsgiving helps us to return to childlike joy. Almsgiving moves us to acknowledge how much we have been given and that fills us with gratitude and praise. Almsgiving frees us from fear by compelling us to surrender what we have and who we are to others. Almsgiving requires humility. As Jesus said, "When you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right is doing, so that your almsgiving may be secret" (Matthew 6:2). True humility always leads to joy. Almsgiving changes us.

It is God who calls us to conversion, and it is God's transforming grace that accompanies us on the Lenten journey as we pray, fast, and give alms. Let us pray for the courage to be open to this grace that we might come to Easter, the biggest banquet of the liturgical year, with hearts cleansed and spirits renewed.


